Caterpillars Class



This term, our topics in Caterpillars have been the Farm and at the Seaside. We have enjoyed learning and exploring these themes. We have shared several books relating to the topics and have also completed related play and learn activities.

Last half term Caterpillars were learning about the farm. We shared farm books and farm activities during our play and learn sessions. We went to Sheldon Country Park where we saw lots of animals and we had a fun time at Spencer's Retreat Farm.









During our seaside topic, we have been creative using different materials; making star fish, paper plate crabs, jelly fish and lots more. We enjoyed a Math's seaside treasure hunt and explored several sea themed sensory activities.

We have made our own beach area where we have sand, water and deck chairs. We have looked closely at shells and sea creatures. Our role play area has been an ice-cream parlour, where we are using PECS to ask for our choice of ice creams and toppings.

We have been on several trips out this term including the park, garden centres, the farm and the allotment. We are doing really well with walking and following instructions when we are out. We all enjoyed our end of year visit to SNAP where we had a fun filled day in the sunshine.

Primary Department



1B Class



This term in 1B, we have explored the topics Stories and Rhymes and People Who Help Us.

In the first half term, we explored the topic Stories and Rhymes, as part of this topic we enjoyed listening to a range of different rhymes including: The Three Little Pigs Song, Each Peach Pear Plum and What Rhymes with... We used different paper collage materials to collage items related to the story and enjoyed finding objects related to each of the texts hidden in different sensory materials – sometimes getting very messy. This term we have also been working really hard on our mark making and have been exploring using different tools to make marks as well as exploring sensory materials. In science, our topic was plants. During our science lessons we explored different types of flowers and planted our own seeds to grow cress, beans and sunflowers. As part of our geography topic, we explored our local and wider environment by walking around school and the local area – visiting the school allotment. As part of this topic, we also went out and about on the school minibus; which we all enjoyed and had lots of fun!

In the second half term, we explored the topic People Who Help Us, as part of this topic we explored the following texts: Emergency, Let's meet people who help us and Miss Polly had a dolly. As part of this topic we explored lots of different people who help us through sensory exploration. We have also dressed up and role played being doctors, firefighters and police officers! During our Attention Autism sessions, we have been using water pistols to put out fires! As part of our History topic we all became nurses and used bandages to look after sick babies and dolls. In science this term we have been exploring how different materials mix, we have made gloop, created fizzy shapes and watched how some materials dissolved in water.

During our math's sessions this term we have been working really hard on developing our understanding of number through a range of practical activities and familiar songs. We have also explored position and direction where we explored weighing and measuring different objects and exploring them with our hands. We have also continued to explore a range of 2d and 3d shapes for a range of purposes.

In PSHE, we have explored relationships and changing me. As part of these topics we have been learning our basic body parts and exploring photos of our families as well as looking at photos of

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
ourselves as babies. We also worked on being a good friend and sharing and taking turns as well as greeting people we know.

We have had a very busy Summer term in 1B and have worked really hard. 1W Class

This term, our topics have been Stories and Rhymes and People Who Help Us. In the first half term, we read some traditional tales such as The Three Little Pigs and stories which had a play on words that made us giggle, such as Rhyme Crime. We made collages of traditional rhymes such as Humpty Dumpty and built our own houses like the Little Pigs. In science, our topic was Plants, and we planted beans, peas and marigolds. We also enjoyed setting up an obstacle course in our classroom as part of our healthy me topic.

We are looking forward to settling into our new classes in September, but we will always remember what a great class 1S has been. Our teachers are very proud of us.









2R Class

2R have had a fantastic Summer term exploring our topics 'Body wise' and 'The Rainforest'. During our body wise topic, the children had the opportunity to explore how the human body works, learning the name of different body parts, and exploring the function of different organs. During our Rainforest topic 2R explored what we can find in a rainforest, it's climate, the animals and plants. For our science lessons, 2R have been developing their understanding of plants and how they grow. 2R enjoyed watching time lapses of plants growing and also planted their very own sunflower. We also continued to enjoy visits to the school library where we would choose a book to look at and take one home. This term our topic has been celebrations. We have enjoyed listening to the story 'The Birthday Presents' by Paul Stewart and learning about lots of other celebrations such as Diwali and Bonfire Night through non-fiction books and rhymes. We have also been very lucky to work with Lori from the Hippodrome. We have been continuing to work hard in Maths. We have learnt all about time, making our own clocks, ordering key events of our day e.g. breakfast, school, minibus, dinner, bath and bed and doing lots of jigsaws related to time. In Science this term, as part of our Animals and Humans topic we explored pictures of our friends as babies and children. We

also had lots of fun matching our pictures, using mirrors to explore our facial features and using imaginative play to role play different activities within the home e.g. brushing hair, having a bath and setting the table. We have also continued to explore materials as our final topic, this term.

In Art, we have been mixing different paints together, to explore the different secondary colours. We were also fortunate to have been invited on a trip to the Midlands Art Centre (MAC) to see the work we created as part of the Common Arts Project in the Spring term and participate in an Eco

printing workshop. We had lots of fun! We also got to visit the cinema where we watched a film about the project. Thank you to Miss Roberts and the MAC for organising.



2P Class


2P have had a very busy Summer term. We started in Summer 1 with our 'Roald Dahl' topic. The children enjoyed lots of Roald Dahl themed activities, including making dream jars and dream catchers, exploring the 'chocolate river,' painting Mr. Twits beard and exploring 'Wormy Pasta.' In Summer 2, we explored our 'Creepy Crawlies' topic, looking at key texts 'Walter's Wonderful Web' 'Bugs' and 'Incy Wincy Spider.' The children have enjoyed lots of mark making, decorating and colouring different bugs, tracing and making their own spider's webs, and sequencing pictures from our key texts.

2P have also been working hard in Math's, exploring numbers, completing lots of counting and sorting activities, and exploring and identifying shapes.

In Science lessons, in Summer 1, 2P explored sound – using different instruments and everyday items to make different sounds and exploring sound buttons and noisy toys. In Summer 2, we looked at 'what we need to stay healthy' – with lessons focusing on brushing teeth, washing hands, healthy foods and being able to make a drink.

2P are well and truly ready to break up for Summer after a fantastic, but very busy year. 2P hope everyone enjoys the 6 weeks' holidays and looks forward to coming back to school, to do it all again, in September.













2C Class



Summer term seems to have flown by this year. In the first part of the term, our topic was 'Fighting Fit'. We read the book 'Daisy Eat your peas' by Kes Gray and also looked at what children liked to order when they go out to eat, looking at different menu's We also looked at Non-Fiction Jesse Owen-Little People Big Dreams by Marie Isabel Sanchez Vegara. We looked at Jesse Owens Biography and wrote about his life events. Over the last term our topic has been about celebrations. We have been looking at how different people celebrate different events around the world. The children had a trip to The Mac Canon Hill Park. On arrival at The Mac, we watched a video about Art workshops from the different schools. The class enjoyed the art workshop where they used rollers and material to make different patterns. We also looked at the art displays of all the other schools that took part.

In Maths we have been looking at telling the time, we have learnt what the different hands on the clock mean and our following topic was fractions where we learnt how to share items equally and split them up into varying fractions.

Our Geography and Art topic has been Japan and we have learnt lots about the differences between our community and theirs. We have looked at their traditional dress, the kimono, and even had a go at designing our own. In the Japanese culture, they have children's day which is a holiday where they fly Koinoboroi, which are carp fish kites, and they represent the strength and perseverance the children should have.

We also have started having open theatre sessions where the children have been dressing up and expressing themselves through acting and role playing which they thoroughly enjoyed.

As the weather has been slightly warmer, we were able to have our sports day and our parents were able to come in and watch. We had different events like the egg and spoon race, long jump and toss the bean bag, the parents also had a go at some of the races which was very fun.



2H Class



This half term 2H have been exploring 'Creepy Crawlies'. In English we have been reading Walters Wonderful Web, The Bug book and have been enjoying the poem Incy Wincy spider. We have been creating our own webs using crafts, tracing and copying words and patterns for our webs and using ALD boards to comment on what we can see stuck on different sensory webs. In Maths we have been exploring number and shape through our key texts for example, by making sets of insects and sorting different bugs into their corresponding groups.

In Science, we have been looking at animals and humans. We have looked at healthy living including tasting healthy and unhealthy foods, brushing teeth and explored different animals and their habitats. In Art we have focused on using chalk to draw and colour different insects. We specifically enjoyed using our fingers to rub the chalk in. In PSHE we have been looking at our bodies. We have explored our senses, recreated our own human bodies and labelled the different parts of the body. In Geography, our country of focus has been Australia. We have enjoyed recreating the Australian flag, making Australian foods such as fairy bread and exploring Aboriginal art.

We have been working on walking in the local environment this term and building up how long we can walk far. All the children have progressed superbly in this and listened really well to instructions in the community. We are super excited for our end of year trip to West Midlands Safari Park! It has been an amazing year in 2H and all the staff are so proud of all the achievements the pupils have made! Well done 2H!









2B Class

Class 2B have had a busy final term this year. Let's see what Class 2B have been learning this term. Our themes for this term are Fighting Fit and Celebrations.

In English, we enjoyed reading the story Daisy Eat Your Peas. The children created a menu for Daisy, exploring various food choices she might like. We also loved reading The Birthday Present by Paul Stewart. The children sequenced and ordered parts of the story, matching symbols or words to pictures. In Maths, the focus has been on numbers, money, and time. The children have been learning number words and practicing their number formation. They had great fun participating in a role-play shop, exchanging coins for food or their favourite toys. We have also been learning about days of the week and practiced telling time to the hour and half-hour.

In Geography, the children explored Japan. They decorated a Japanese flag using different collage materials and located Japan on a map. They also explored famous landmarks and matched pictures and symbols. In Art and Design, the children have been painting and experimenting with colour mixing. They mixed primary colours to create new ones and made a colour wheel.

Class 2B have also enjoyed working with our Forest School Leader, Sami! Our swimming lessons at Kingstanding Wellbeing Centre have been a highlight, with children growing more confident in the water over the term.

This half-term, Class 2B has had the pleasure of working with Lori Hopkins from the Birmingham Hippodrome. Lori is a puppeteer, and the children have had a fantastic time engaging in drama and role play over the last five weeks.

Our themes for the Summer term have been 'Enterprise Project' and 'Lights, Camera, Action'. In English we learned all about limericks and how to write one. During this term year 8 are taking part with the Green Business Challenge organised by Willmott Dixon. The pupils have learnt about construction, who are WD, job roles and the safety wear worn on site. They have also learnt about renewable resources and why they are important in the building sector, learning about 4 specific job roles which include management, design, budgeting and sustainability. Further to this, students have planned, costed, designed and built a model eco village working in teams of four and taking on one of the job roles above.

Year 8 took part in a Holi Art session where they had the opportunity to learn about The Holi festival which is cultural significance among various Hindu traditions of the Indian subcontinent. Later on in the term we revisited the allotment to see the potatoes we placed in for seed earlier in the year. We had lots to harvest and where really impressed with our farming ability. We also did an overall tidy up and watering of all that is growing there.









3M Class

This summer term has been an exceptional period for 3M, filled with remarkable achievements and memorable moments. In the second term, 3M have created their own story using pictures and written sentences about the story they have read. In the first term, in Maths we have looked at position, direction and statistics. 3M has explored bar charts, block diagrams, tally charts and line graphs, and are beginning to have an enhanced understanding of different types of charts. In the second term, 3M have been exploring fractions such as halves, quarters, and thirds. 3M have been finding a half or a quarter practically, whilst others have been finding and naming fractions. 3M have also been looking at multiplication and division facts. We have been able to recall multiplication and division facts by using arrays. I am impressed as 3M has exceeded in this! We have also been adding and subtracting one-step word problems and 3M has thrived in this. Well done!

As we wrap up this summer term, it's clear that 3M has had an incredible journey filled with both fun and learning. From engaging classroom activities to exciting outdoor adventures, each day has brought new opportunities for growth and discovery. The 5 ways to wellbeing:

Connect	Connect with people around you. Spend time with your friends and family. Make new friends. Find new ways to communicate.

Take Notice	Take time to be still, reflect, and become aware of your surroundings. Notice what you are thinking and be aware of what is going on in the world around you: the everyday and the unusual. Be curious.

Giving	Do something nice for a friend. Thank someone. Smile. Volunteer your time. Raise money for charity

Tips for Talking About Mental Health

Make conversations about mental health a normal part of life: Anywhere is a good place to talk; in the car, walking the dog or cooking together. Model everyday talk about feelings such as by talking about a TV character's feelings.





Give your full attention: We all know it's horrible to be half listened to. Keep eye contact, focus on the child and ignore distractions.

Check your body language: Try to keep it open and relaxed and make sure you come down to the child's level.

> Take it seriously: Don't downplay what the child is saying or tell them they're "just being silly". Resist the urge to reassure them that everything is fine.

Ask open questions: Such as "How did your day go today?" This will help to extend the conversation.



6 Calmly stay with the feelings that arise: It can be our automatic reaction to steer away from difficult emotions.

7 Offer empathy rather than solutions: Show that you accept what they are telling you but don't try to solve the problem.

Remember we are all different: Respect and value the child's feelings, even though they may be different to yours.

Look for clues about feelings: Listen to the child's words, tone of voice and body language.

Some ways to start a conversation about feelings might be:

"How are you feeling at the moment?"
"You don't seem your usual self. Do you want to talk about it?"

"Do you fancy a chat?"

"I'm happy to listen if you need a chat."





Occupational Therapy (OT)



Over the last term we have been busy delivering two workshops for parents, one focussing on developing skills for independence looking at foundational skills including promoting a pincer grasp and midline crossing. The second workshop was an online webinar focussing on sensory processing differences and how you can support at home. I thought I would share with you all some of favourite activities that you can try with your children at home over the summer to promote regulation and develop motor skills.

Zoom Ball




This is a great activity to promote bilateral integration (using the two sides of the body together). It also works on timing and sequencing movement and really promotes connection with the other person. The rhythmical action of the activity is calming, and the proprioception provided through the movement is regulating.

Pop up tunnel




A pop-up tunnel is a great activity that promotes proprioceptive input through weight baring as the child crawls, you can make it part of an obstacle course or pass and ball back and forth through the tunnel.



This threading activity promotes pincer grasp, manual dexterity and sequencing all important foundational skills in handwriting and other independence skills such as dressing.

Music Therapy





Sing and Sign Assemblies

Throughout this year interested classes from both primary and secondary have been participating in weekly sing and sign sessions, facilitated by our Music Therapist Leanne and class teacher Jackie. Sing and sign sessions have many benefits, including increased social awareness and tolerance, engagement in creative and musical activity, increased wellbeing and exploration of new communication tools. Song choices have included Disney favourites, pop songs, action songs and nursery rhymes. The children have engaged well in sessions during the year, improving both their singing and signing. More recently, classes who have chosen to participate have been rehearsing for a concert/assembly on 11th July where they showcased to parents their achievements, progress and love for music.

Art Project

Art Exhibition 22nd – 27th June 2024

This term, The Pines have once again been given the amazing opportunity to work together with the other schools in our trust and contribute to an arts exhibition — The Co-operative Trust Arts Project. This project aimed to develop the arts within our school and resulted in creating a piece of artwork to be proudly displayed within the exhibition at the Midlands Art Centre (MAC).

As a school, we have worked with an amazing artist called Sam and have focused on using three different types of clay; air drying clay, colour clay and foam clay. Over the past couple of weeks 2M, 2D, 2C and 2W have all had the chance to participate within the art activities, focusing on a sensory approach. We have worked with Sam to create a collaborative piece of artwork incorporating different creative ideas. Here, she was able to share her experiences with the classes. They were able to develop both their communication and art skills, moving away from using paint and paintbrushes to using a range of different sculpting tools, egg slicers to create even



clay slices and different techniques such as; slicing, peeling, stenciling, puncturing and mark-making. The class thoroughly enjoyed this experience and especially relished seeing their artwork being proudly displayed within the MAC. It was a fantastic experience and they were even able to participate in an Eco printing workshop and watched themselves in the film about the project within the cinema. They had lots of fun!

Thank you so much to the students who have worked together to create something beautiful which will be proudly displayed within our school. I know the students — and the staff — enjoyed this experience and hopefully we will be able to invite more artists in to share their experiences with even more classes.

The Behaviour Outside School Support (BOSS) group met earlier this term and had a general chat. We try to base the meetings around what parents and carers want to talk about at the time, rather than having a specific agenda, although we start off with something to get us talking. This time it was Causes of, and Strategies for Distressed Behaviour, but we were soon off that and onto specifics, which is great.

We are trying to have the meetings on different days to try to include as many parents / carers who wish to come as possible.

Anyone can come, right from our youngest to our oldest children, and after you've had your summer holiday it would be great to see you in September, which can be a difficult time as there are lots of changes. Often talking about what is happening and trying out ideas, some of which may be new (or others that might have worked before but been stopped because the behaviour has stopped) can help.

After School Clubs

This year has seen the introduction of After-School Clubs across school. From 4th March we have offered weekly after school club for secondary pupils every Monday and every Tuesday for primary pupils. We were able to offer a place to all the pupils whose families requested a place, 16 of those were secondary pupils and 16 were primary, with children being split in to two cohorts, offering each cohort a block of 7 sessions each.

The primary After-school club also offered weekly cooking sessions which was well received by the first cohort of pupils and it was demonstrated through pupil voice that they enjoyed cooking and being with different people. The second cohort of primary pupils saw us able to offer access to the sensory circuit room, forest school, the bikes and scooters in the outdoor area, the sensory room and the iPad's.... always a firm favourite!

We have achieved the silver award for rights respecting schools, during this term. This is a whole school initiative that everyone has been working towards.

We've offered a range of exciting workshops presented by some of the fantastic staff in school, including Laura Graham (Occupational Therapist), Sami (Forest School), Michelle H (Mental Health week), Miss Rudd (Early Reading Skills) and Mrs Jenkins (toileting workshop). We are starting to put together another year of exciting guest speakers for parent/carer workshops for next year!

A huge thank you to our committed group of parents and carers who regularly attend our monthly coffee mornings, it's always lovely to welcome families into school. We hope you find this useful and look forward to welcoming more families next year. Coffee mornings are held once a month, look out for our calendar of events early in September.

Duke of Edinburgh Award





This term, pupils completing the Duke of Edinburgh Award have successfully completed their Bronze Expedition. We conducted an Urban Expedition with our M pathway; Restricted Spaces with our M/E and E pathway pupils. Our M pathway aimed to walk a total combined distance suitable for a mountain hike, completing 264km in total (equivalent to a walk from Everest Base to Summit, and back.) Our M/E and E pathway group set a target to develop their communication skills in different areas: accessing forest school to make a warm meal and bunting, allotments to help support with tasks to help maintain and upkeep the allotments and taking part in physical activity in the community at Action Indoor Sports.

During their time completing the award, pupils have collectively spent 709 hours Volunteering - around school with recycling, magic breakfast, helping teachers to name a few, 672 hours completing physical activity - through PE and clubs, visits into the local community and accessing sensory circuits and 720 hours developing their skills - such as Art, Cooking, Music and Tesco.

We are sending off the awards for verification over summer and hope to share with you their successes in the 2024/25 academic year ahead of our new cohort beginning their Duke of Edinburgh journey.

<u>Pupil Voice:</u> How have you found the Duke of Edinburgh experience and expedition?

"I found it pretty exciting and fun, to be fair. I mean, I walked to Tesco's and back in an hour for the expedition it was probably the best moment of it. I'd say involved like mental strength that's what I would say we needed. My one word to describe the Duke of Edinburgh is entertaining."
